MRS. BILLINGTON DIES

Sarah Jane Hodson Billington died Sunday at the home ranch, 22 miles southeast of Lind, at the age of 71 years. Mrs. Billington had suffered for some time with a bone infection, but was cheerful throughout despite her affliction. The funeral was held at the home, Rev. Randall officiating, and interment was in the cemetery at Ritzville, yesterday forenoon, many attending from Lind.

Sarha Jane Hodson was born i Iowa, June 9, 1857, and came to Oregon with her parents when two years of age, traveling in a covered wagon drawn by ox teams via the old Oregon trail. She was married to George Billington on September 5, 1878, who passed away August 20, 1924. To them were born six children, all of whom survive as follows: Alvin of Lind, Glenn and Garrett of Washtucna, Mrs. R. E. DeVore of Lind, and Mrs. Mark Mills of Fruitland. When a young woman she united with the Christian Church at Centerville, Wash., her religious convictions being sincere and deep.

The sympathy of the community is extended to the sorrowing family.

MATRON DIES AT AGE OF 71

Mrs. Sarah Jane Billington, aged 71, widow of George William Billington, an early settler of Adams county who died in 1924, passed away on Sunday, Jan. 27, at the family home between Lind and Washtucn. Mrs. Billington had been ill for several months and was at one time confined to a Spokane

hospital, having arrived home only a few weeks before her death.

Mrs. Billington was born i Iowa on June 4, 1857, the daughter of Enos and Rose Hodson. She had been a resident of Adams county for many years.

The deceased is survived by three sons, Glenn and Garrett, residing on the family ranch near Washtucna, and Alva, of Fruitland; three daughters, Mrs. C. P. Blankenship of Washtucna, Mrs. Mark Mills of Fruitland and Mrs. Ralph De Vore of Lind, as well as several grandchildren.

The funeral was held from the home, at 11:00 A.M. Wednesday, Jan. 30, the Rev. H. S. Randall of Lind officiating. Burial was in the Ritzville cemetery.

Hatton, 131/2 miles southwest of Cunningham (NW Section 9, T15N, R30E) When first homesteaders came to the panhandle of Adams County in the spring of 1901, there was nothing to greet them but a vast expanse of sagebrush as far as the eye could see and except for the herds of wild horses and an occasional rider fron the Hutchinson ranch, ther was no sign of human habitation.

By the fall of 1901 and into the spring of 1902, enough settlers had come into the territory that a general store ws found necessary. A trip to Cunningham or Hatton by team consumed too much time.

A homesteader, Philip J. Amer, decided to to fill this need and established a small general store and post office called Billington, on July 3, 1902. The post office was named for the homesteaders upon whose land the store was built. Mr. Amer was the first postmaster at Billington, Washington. Philip J. Amer conducted Billington post office in a little store on his homestead which was near the home of George Billington. It served homsteaders who were coming in 1902 and 1903. The post office did not move even after its name changed to Hamlet. The order to change the name to Amer had been rescinded. Mr. Amer first submitted Bourbon as the name. It was not approved. George Billington's home was about a half-mile north of Amer's little store (NE/NE section 8); his daughter Lily had taken the homestead in her name. The post office was opened to serve a "small village of 18 or 20" according to the location report of February 7, 1902. Because of the fact that the name Billington, Washington was so often confused with Bellingham, Washington (also Billings, Montana), Mr. Amer. the postmaster at Billington, circulated a petition in the winter of 1905 to have the name changed to Amer. This ws done on February 9, 1905. This name ws retained until July 3, 1905 when William H. Hodson (George's brother-in-law) ws appointed postmaster. By that time, Mr. Amer had sold out and left. Mr. Hodson evidently thought the name should be changed, therefore, the name Hamlet was suggested. Mr. Hodson may have suggested this name or the postal inspector. In any case, Amer, Wshington became Hamlet, Washington on July 3, 1905. The postoffice was discontinued on April 30, 1907.

Pioneer Dies Served On Staff Of Gov. Ferry

George W. Billington died at his farm home near Washtucna last Thursday afternoon, August 21.

His death takes away one of the leading farmers of the county and one who has been a pioneer in

the development of the west. He had been suffering with heart trouble since early July and was

confined to his bed the past two weeks.

Funeral services were held at the home Sunday noon, conducted by Rev. J. T. Eschelman of

Tacoma. Interment took place at the Ritzville cemetery, the Masons having charge of the committal service.

The story of the life of Mr. Billington is the story of those who, leaving the eastern states

in early life, moved to the West and contributed their manhood to the development of this great

empire. Mr. Billington was born in Oshkosh, Wis., August 30, 1855. In 1873 he came to California,

traveling over the recently completed railway to the Pacific. In 1874 he came by boat to Portland.

He was united in marriage to Miss Sarah Jane Hodgson, Sept. 5, 1878, locating near Centerville.

Mr. Billington became a member of the national guard in 1885 and was successively advanced

to second lieutenant, first lieutenant and captain. He served on the staff of Gov. Elisha Ferry,

the last territorial governor. In 1902 Mr. Billington and his family removed to the southwest part

of Adams County, near what later was established as the town of Othello. In 1911 they removed to

the Lind neighborhood and have since resided in that vicinity.

Mr. Billington is survived by his wife, and by three sons and three daughters. They are:

Alvin of Lind; Glenn and Garrett, of Washtucna; Mrs. C. P. Blankenship of Washtucna; Mrs. Ralph

Devore, of Lind, and Miss Ellen, at home. He also leaves two brothers and three sisters, residing

at a distance. A brother-in-law, W. H. Hodson, of Othello, was present at the funeral.

A note of interest in this connection is that just about the hour that the life of Mr.

Billington was passing away, a baby boy was born to his daughter, Mrs. Devore. Thus it is that

the chain of life continues.
